Cober Hill 2016

The York and District Guild of Weavers, Spinners and Dyers has an annual weekend away at Cober Hill in Cloughton near Scarborough.

There is a workshop as well as space to do your own thing. There is, as always, a Do-Your-Own-Thing, and a workshop, which this year is on Reading and Creating Drafts on Your 4 (or more) Shaft Loom, with Beverly Usher. Beverly has been weaving since 1977 and has a special interest in weave structures. As soon as she started to make her first fabric, she has been fascinated with what can be created by simply changing threadings or treadlings or yarns. She has experimented with a wide range of weave structures to make clothing and practical items. She loves working with finer yarns (36-60 ends per inch). The workshop will focus on how to translate the drafts from a variety of sources into a working warp on your loom. She will also offer tips and techniques for warping, threading, sleying and weaving. We will hopefully look at a variety of drafts, then warp up the looms with narrow warps and get them threaded up and ready to experiment. Ideally, we will have a 'round robin' and everyone will get to weave on a few looms to experience weaving at least 5 or 6 structures.

If you are interested, please contact Beverly (bnpusher@yahoo.com) to discuss your particular area of interest so the workshop can be configured to meet your needs.

The dates this year are3 to 5 June 2016. People are welcome to arrive from 4 pm on the Friday, and depart by 4 pm on Sunday after Sunday lunch. The workshop starts on Friday evening with a talk and introduction and those Doing-Your-Own-Thing can start doing after the evening meal. The fee is £225 for the weekend if you are doing the workshop, or £165 if you are doing your own thing.

Cober Hill is a lovely conference centre set near the North Sea just north of Scarborough. The weekend is a wonderful get away, with comfortable rooms, good food and excellent company. There are lovely walks on cliff tops over the sea nearby.

In addition to a workshop, many guild members go along and do their own thing in a large room with ample space to work. The entire group meets for coffees and teas, as well as meals. It is always a great weekend for everyone attending. The York and District Guild welcome participants from other guilds. Rosemary is the beloved, internationally respected Senior Curator for South and Southeast Asian Textiles and Dress, Middle Eastern Carpets, Textiles and Dress, and South Asian painting.
